Cursed...Blessed...Woe to you...

Today's readings give a different point to messages from Jesus than we are used to hearing, particularly Luke's account of the Sermon on the Mount or in his words, Sermon on the Plain.

First in Jeramiah's passage we hear, *"Cursed is the one who trusts in human beings, who seeks his strength in flesh, whose heart turns away from the Lord. ...Blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord, whose hope is the Lord."*

Placing hope and faith totally in humans means we turn from our Lord. Today, we have many pushing us to believe in their words rather than follow God's. We have Religion attacked, we have activities pulling us away, we see principles faithful to God's way challenged for personal rights. Media spreads clips rather than full stories. They color news with their point of view not just giving true news and all the facts as we had in the past. We are being pushed to live for this life alone.

But we need to heed the words from St. Paul from the Second reading, *"If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are the most pitiable of people of all."*

Yes, if we live just for the **now** what do we have to look forward to? Always needing more is what happens when living just for life. Think on this, if near death and you were asked, "Do you have any regrets or fears about facing your end?" How would you answer?

My Dad was asked at his death this very question. He answered, "I am not afraid. I feel I treated everyone fairly in life. My biggest regret is not getting to watch my grandchildren grow up." For 24 years we have remembered his words and still feel his guidance. When we have faith in God's plan, we can have trust and comfort even in the difficult times. When we live in belief of Jesus, we can face even death without fear.

I came across a site once where you can secure your place in heaven for \$13.95 **AND** you don't have to worry! IF you don't make it you can get your money back! Are we humans not truly blinded to the truth when an easy way is presented to us? It seems so!

"Woe to you who are rich, filled, laugh now, are spoken well of by others..."

These last 4 points in the Gospel are ones on which we seldom focus attention. Was Jesus telling some they had already received their rewards? Are those who have more in life doomed? Was He just warning things can change? Do we live seeking greatness and reward now or do we focus on living for the Lord?

Living for the Lord occurs in all levels of economic status. On the other hand, living for self does too. What we have received in life is a gift. How we perceive it is the key. Approaching life to do for the Lord can be seen in people. They give and share what little or great they have without question. Today's Gospel is continuing to set the stage for the conflicts Jesus will have with those in higher authority in society in His time. Those who have not come to realize the greatest authority is not themselves, but God!

Over the years I have often focused on "Blessed are you who are poor *in spirit*." Two points hit me. One was that quite often the most generous are those with little. If we live as poor, we might have more open hearts. This is often seen in shelters and food pantries. Possessions are often seen as gifts from God to share. Second to me was to think of poor in spirit in terms of spiritual richness. If we consider ourselves poor in spirit, we may seek to know God better. We would seek to be closer to him.

Read carefully the Gospel (Luke 6:17,20-26) again. It is never too late to become blessed. Turn to Jesus this week. Put your faith in Him. He is the one true way.

Faith Sharing Questions

Theme of this week's Gospel: Jesus came with the twelve disciples and gave the speech called "The Beatitudes." He promised happiness and blessings to those who accept the Gospel and sorrow and woe to those who only look for wealth and pleasure.

Adults: How can you follow the teachings in the beatitudes in your life today? Who can you feed, clothe, help to have a better life?

Teens: What message do you think Jesus was trying to send to His disciples? If Jesus were living His life today, what message do you think He would give His followers? Would it have changed over two thousand years?

Children: Can you think of one of your friends that you can help today? Maybe you could share a treat with them...invite them for a play date...ask them to spend the night at your house.

Next Sunday, February 24, 2019 Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle C

We have a few weeks of the Liturgical Season called "Ordinary Time" between the end of the Christmas Season (the last day is the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord) and the beginning of Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday (March 6th this year). The priest wears green vestments during Ordinary Time, unless there is a special feast. We are in cycle C, and so our Gospel reading this year will feature the Gospel of Luke. During Ordinary Time the first reading, from the Old Testament, is chosen because of a thematic relation to the Gospel reading. For the second reading, we read semi-continuously from a New Testament letter, currently 1 Corinthians.

Gospel (Luke 6:27-38): This passage is a continuation of the "Sermon on the Plain" in the Gospel of Luke. As with the Sermon on the Mount in the Gospel of Matthew, the Beatitudes of last Sunday give way to more direct teaching of Jesus, in this case about love of enemies, turning the other cheek, not judging and living life with a generous heart toward all.

First Reading (1 Samuel 26:2,7-9,12-13,22-23): David has an opportunity to kill his king—Saul—who has been trying to kill him. David refuses to do so, out of respect for the Lord, for Saul is "the Lord's anointed." However, David makes sure that King Saul knows that he had the opportunity, but did not take it out of respect for the Lord who anointed him (Saul). This is an example of the very thing Jesus speaks about in today's Gospel reading about love of enemies.

Second Reading (1 Corinthians 15:45-49): Paul reflects upon Adam's "earthly nature" that was transformed into a spiritual nature by God in the act of creation. Paul sees in this a foreshadowing of the transformation effected in us all by Christ.

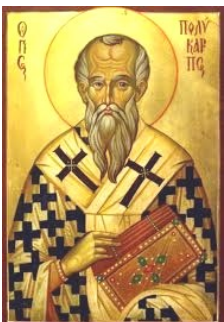
Thanks From Bishop Foys

Saint of the Week

Saint Polycarp



The exact date of Polycarp's birth is not known however it is believed that he was born in A.D. 69. He was born in Smyrna, now Izmir, a city on the west coast of Turkey. Very little is known of his life but it is believed that he was ordained a bishop by Saint John the Evangelist. He is considered one of the three main Apostolic Fathers of the Church, along with Saint Ignatius and Saint Clement of Rome. The Apostolic Fathers are

authors of writings that, although not included in the New Testament, were very important in the early Church and are important now for an understanding of the early Church.

Polycarp is famous for his writings, which are some of the earliest that survived in the Church. He wrote a letter to the Philippians, now known as *Polycarp's Letter to the Philippians*. The letter is a warning against apostasy (abandonment of religion) and encourages good works by Christians. A letter to him is included in the *Letters of Saint Ignatius*.

Of the few things that are known about Polycarp outside of his writings, one concerns a visit to Rome where he met with Pope Anicetus (later a saint). They met to discuss certain differences between the churches in Asia and those in Europe. One area of difference was the date of Easter. The Asian church based the determination of Easter on the Jewish Passover celebrating it on the same day regardless of the day of the week that it occurred, while the European church celebrated it on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox, which is March 21st (as we do today).

Another early work on Polycarp is the *Martyrdom of Polycarp* written shortly after his death. It is the oldest description of a Christian martyrdom after the account of the death of Saint Stephen in the Acts of the Apostles. It describes Polycarp's death at the hands of the Romans. He was martyred for refusing to burn incense to the emperor. He is reported to have asked, "How can I blaspheme my King and Savior? Bring forth what thou wilt." He was burned at the stake but the flames would not burn him so then he was stabbed. His feast day is February 23rd and he is honored because of his writings.

Life Line Screening

Life Line Screening, a leading provider of community-based preventive health screenings, will be at Saint Agnes in Murphy Hall on Tuesday, March 19th. 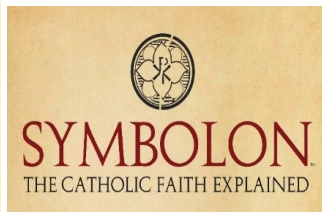

Mary's Meals Founder To Speak at TMU

Thomas More University announces that Magnus MacFarlane-Barrow, founder and CEO of Mary's Meals, is to speak on campus Tuesday, Feb. 19th. This event is free and open to the community and will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the Connor Convocation Center. Magnus MacFarlane-Barrow is the founder and CEO of the global child hunger charity, Mary's Meals.

The former salmon farmer from Argyll in Scotland founded Mary's Meals in Malawi in 2002 after he met a young woman called Emma who was dying from AIDS. She was sitting on the mud floor of her hut surrounded by her children. When MacFarlane-Barrow asked her 14-year-old son, Edward, what his dreams were in life, his stark reply was: "To have enough food to eat and to go to school one day." This was a key part of the inspiration that led to the Mary's Meals campaign.

Mary's Meals, which began feeding 200 children in one school in Malawi in 2002, now reaches 1,361,586 children with a daily meal in their place of education in 17 countries, including Malawi, India, Kenya, Lebanon, South Sudan, Haiti, Syria and Ethiopia. By providing a daily meal in a place of education, Mary's Meals encourages chronically hungry children into the classroom - often for the first time - where they can gain an education that can provide a route out of poverty. The founder will not only be speaking at the evening event open to the community, but he will engage one-on-one with students in classes during his visit.
