Dear Friends

The 3rd, 4th & 5th Sundays of Lent in Cycle A are filled with conversion stories. Last Sunday was the woman at the well, today the blind man and next week the raising of Lazarus. These stories contain four distinct elements: a person is touched by Jesus, a person accepts Jesus, a person witnesses about Jesus, and the other person reacts to the person's witness.

The experiences of the blind man and the woman are especially similar when they look at the first three points. Both the woman and the blind man encounter Jesus and are healed by him. She was healed of her past sins and he from his physical blindness. Both come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah. And both began to witness about Him.

The main difference in these two stories lies in the way that the other people responded. The people of Samaria were moved by the woman's witness and came to believe in Jesus. But many of the people surrounding the blind man closed their hearts and rejected him. Both stories tell us that Jesus wants to enliven our faith. Although we can't touch Jesus physically, we can still experience his presence.

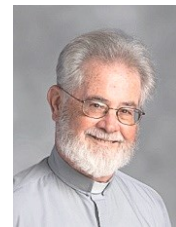
Jesus is always reaching out to us. Each day, He is with us, urging us to look to Him for help and inspiration. What's more, His Holy Spirit is in us, convincing us that we are God's beloved children.

Without Jesus' healing, it's unlikely that the woman at the well or the blind man would ever have changed. She was stuck in a fruitless search for love and belonging. He was trapped in the indifference of the people around him. But Jesus lifted them out of their prisons and set them on a new path.

We are all stuck in one way or another. Sometimes it's because of our poor decisions and sometimes it's just part of living. But

regardless of how you got stuck, Jesus is still reaching out to you. So let Him put His arms around you today and lift you up.

Faith Sharing Questions

Theme of this week's Gospel: Jesus gives sight to a man who had been blind since birth and the Pharisees claimed that Jesus had not healed him.

Teens: Have you ever been accused of doing something bad when you actually hadn't done anything wrong? How did you feel? How do you think Jesus felt when He was accused of being a sinner because He healed the blind man on the Sabbath?

Children: How are your Lenten resolutions going? Can you do something really special these last few weeks for Jesus?

The Fifth Sunday of Lent, Cycle A

Lent is a time set aside by our church for the purpose of preparing ourselves to renew our Baptismal promises at Easter. Catechumens (now called "Elect") prepare to make those promises for the first time. It is helpful to keep this in mind as we study the readings during Lent. On the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Cycle A, our Gospel reading is from John. They are three very dramatic stories concerning a coming to faith: 1) The Samaritan woman at the well, 2) The healing of the man born blind, and 3) The raising of Lazarus from the dead. These three stories have long been associated with Lent and the instruction of catechumens in their journey of faith to Baptism, so much so that even when we are in Cycle B, or C, on these three Sundays these readings may be used.

Gospel Reading (John 11:1-45): A rough outline of the Gospel of John would divide it into two “books”: the “Book of Signs” (chapters 1-12) and the “Book of Glory” (Chapters 13-21). In the Book of Signs there are seven signs. (John doesn’t use the word “miracle.”) These signs seem to point to THE sign that is described in the “Book of Glory:” the death and resurrection of Jesus. The seven signs are: 1) Changing water to wine at the wedding in Cana, 2) Healing the royal official’s son at Capernaum, 3) Healing the paralytic at Bethsaida, 4) Feeding the 5,000, 5) Jesus walking on water, 6) Jesus heals the man blind from birth, and 7) Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead.

The passage for this Sunday is the story of when Jesus raises His friend Lazarus from the dead. In the “Book of Signs,” this is the last of the “signs” that Jesus works, and it is the greatest sign. Jesus’ words “Untie him and let him go” refer not only to Lazarus but point to all of humanity as Jesus will raise humanity and free/untie humanity and let it go from death and the fear of death. This sign leads some to faith, but as we know, despite its greatness, it does not lead everyone to faith. This sign takes place near Jerusalem, where in fact Jesus will encounter His fiercest adversity and ultimately His death.

The event of Lazarus’ death and rising also seems to be a “precursor” of Jesus’ own “being in the tomb” and then rising. For John, “Coming to life” and “coming to faith” are not all that different. One cannot help but be moved by this story in which the faith of Lazarus’ sisters plays a part. It is a hopeful sign that some may “come to life” on the coat-tails of others’ faith. In other words, by our faith, we can bring others to faith, to eternal life and to God.

First Reading (Ezekiel 37:12-14): Ezekiel ministered to the people in exile in Babylon in the 6th century BC. He foresees a day when even those who have died in a foreign land (Babylon) will rise and return to their homeland: “Then you shall know that I am the LORD, when I open your graves and have you rise from them, O my people!”

Second Reading (Romans 8:8-11): In this passage Paul reflects on the role of the “Spirit of the one who raised Jesus from the dead” in giving life to those in whom the Spirit dwells.

We are now in the commitment phase of our 2017 Diocesan Parish Annual Appeal (DPAA). Thank you to everyone who has completed a commitment card or made a donation already. We plan to use any rebates from the 2017 DPAA to help pay for tuck-pointing of our bell-tower.

The more you learn about what the DPAA makes possible for people, the more you want to be a part of it. IT IS IMPORTANT for persons making such donations to contact our parish business manager, Tom Rasp, to alert him about the donation so he can look for the funds to come from the diocese. The diocese accepts these donations of stock but often has no way of knowing which parish is to receive the proceeds.

The diocesan finance office sends acknowledgments to donors for all donations and lets donors know that the proceeds from their donation have been sent to Saint Agnes. If you have arranged to make a donation of stock but have not received such an acknowledgment from the diocese, please contact Tom Rasp or Father Keene. –Thanks you, Father Keene

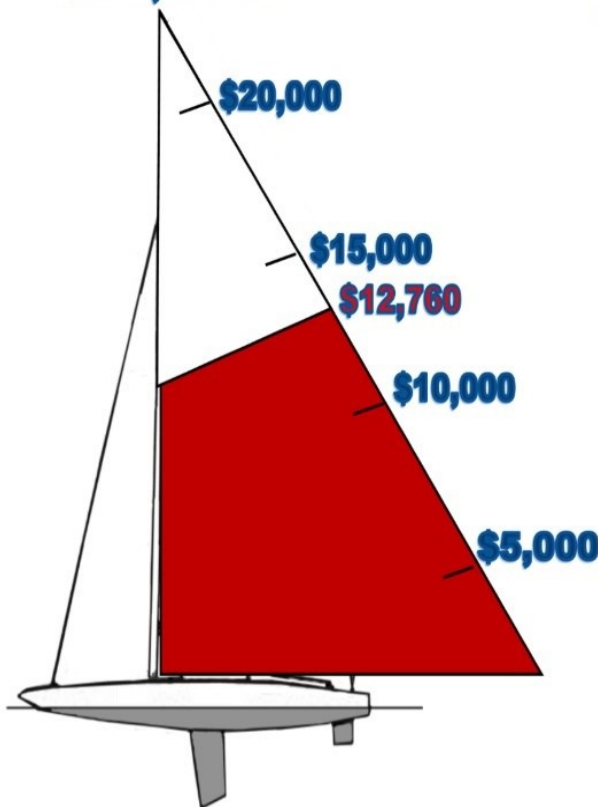
