Staff Article

Dear Friends

One of the best ways to read the story of Jesus' Passion is to put ourselves in His shoes. First, Jesus watched one of His own apostles betray Him with a kiss. Have you ever had someone smile at you on the surface, but then do something to intentionally hurt you? If so, then you have had a taste of the passion. Have you ever had your best friends abandon you in a dark time? If so, you have had a taste of the passion. If you ever had people make up lies and false accusations about you in an effort to destroy your reputation, then you have had a taste of the passion. If you have ever been the brunt of terrible jokes and pranks that hurt, then you have had a taste of the passion.

Was any of this fun? No. Did it hurt you deeply? Probably. Did you get angry, feel humiliated, harbor resentment? Likely. Did you want to get even? Maybe.

At the passion, if Jesus fell prey to one split second of resentment or one moment of anger, He would not have been able to save us. Everything would have been lost. But He didn't. Throughout this ordeal, as unjust as it was, Jesus acted like a lamb led to slaughter. He didn't defend Himself. He didn't fight back. Instead, all Jesus did was say, "Father forgive them."

All of us will face false accusation or abuse or betrayal at some point in our lives. It's likely that most of us already have. As we hear in the passion today, let's resolve to be as merciful as we can to everyone who has hurt us, ridiculed us, betrayed us, or tarnished our reputation. Let's also agree never again to undermine someone or hurt someone.

Reflecting on Jesus passion naturally creates a moment of sorrow in us. It saddens us to see Jesus suffer and be mistreated so much. But it can also help us. We can look at the cross and ask God to help us be more forgiving — just as Jesus was

Easter Sunday: The Resurrection of the Lord, Cycle C

Regardless of which year we are in, (A, B or C), the readings for Easter Sunday are always the same. The Gospel reading is the account of the discovery of the "empty tomb" from the Gospel of John. The First Reading is from the Acts of the Apostles (as it will be during all of Easter Season, both on weekdays and on Sundays). For the Second Reading, there is a choice from either the Letter to the Colossians or First Corinthians.

Gospel (John 20:1-9): This passage is the account from the Gospel According to Saint John of the discovery of the "empty tomb." In all of the Gospels, there is not a single eye-witness account of the moment of Jesus' resurrection. There are only accounts of the discovery of the empty tomb and then later appearances of the resurrected Jesus. This account of the empty tomb from the Gospel of John seems to have much symbolism. It also raises many questions: Who is this "disciple that Jesus loved?" (His name is never given.) Why does he not enter the tomb right away, but defers to Peter? Why the attention to the details

of the burial cloths? While there are no eye-witness accounts of the resurrection itself, there are many eye-witness accounts of the faith/witness of those who claimed to have

experienced the Risen Lord and who suffered—even onto death—in fidelity to that experience.

First Reading (Acts of the Apostles 10:34, 37-43): This passage comes from the first “speech” that Peter gives to Gentiles. It takes place in the home of the Roman centurion, Cornelius. Just prior to this, Peter had a dream which convinced him of the rightness of preaching the Gospel to Gentiles (as opposed to his own Jewish people only) and welcoming them into the community of followers of Jesus. In this address Peter summarizes the purpose of Jesus’ life, death and resurrection and proclaims “that everyone who believes in Him will receive forgiveness of sins through His name.”

Second Reading Option A (Colossians 3:1-4): This reading is from an exhortation to those who are already believers, encouraging them to keep in mind the larger picture, to “think of what is above, not of what is on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ is God.”

Second Reading Option B (1 Corinthians 5:6b-8): Saint Paul reminds the Church at Corinth that “our Paschal lamb, Christ, has been sacrificed. Therefore, let us celebrate the feast, not with the old yeast, the yeast of malice and wickedness, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth.”

Catholic Traditions

Easter and renewal: new oils, new fire, new Paschal Candle, confession and the renewal of Baptismal promises. Much like the season of Spring, with Easter there is a sense of newness and renewal in the Church. At some point, all of the holy water, all of the holy oils, all of the “fire” (the tabernacle vigil lamp), the Paschal (Easter) Candle from the previous Easter, and even all of the hosts that are kept in the tabernacle are removed, extinguished or otherwise properly disposed of.

New oils are blessed each year during the Chrism Mass at the Cathedral.

The first thing that is done at the Easter Vigil is the blessing of a new fire. The new fire is then used to light a new Paschal Candle which is blessed and which will be used throughout the coming year.

During the Easter Vigil, holy water will be blessed for the Baptism of this year’s catechumens/elect. This water will be used to sprinkle us after we renew our Baptismal Promises. This holy water will also be used in the fonts at church, which were emptied on Good Friday.

Any remnants of the Blessed Sacrament (Consecrated hosts or Consecrated wine) that are left after the Good Friday service are to be consumed or properly disposed of (buried). At the Easter Vigil, the Eucharist is celebrated and the remaining Blessed Sacrament is placed in the Tabernacle and the Tabernacle vigil light (which has been extinguished since Holy Thursday evening) is lit. This light has long been a sign of Christ’s “real presence” in the Tabernacle and the Church building.

The renewal of one’s Baptismal Promises is also a motivation for some to use the Sacrament of Reconciliation as a way of readying themselves (“wiping the slate clean”) for this new beginning at Easter.

In many ways, the season of Lent and our Lenten observances have been directing us toward the renewal of our Baptismal Promises. In this sense, we are in solidarity with our “Elect” who will be making their Baptismal Promises for the very first time. It is by our Baptism that we enter the Sacramental life of the Church and so become part of the corporate witness of the Church, which itself is a “Sacrament” to the world. Baptism is never a private matter or a matter solely between the one Baptized and God. By Baptism, we place our lives in union with the lives of all other Christians, who are the Church, who have pledged to live lives in witness to and service to Christ, which is to say in service to all in need. This is discipleship. The Baptism that we share with one another, we share with Christ, so like Christ, we should support one another in our vocations.

Holy Week: Be a Part of It!

Holy Week begins today, Palm Sunday. The most solemn holy days of the year are this week... The most solemn Liturgies are this week. Be a part of your parish's commemorations of these days... Be a part of your parish's worship and thanksgiving to God:

- Palm Sunday: We commemorate the Lord's entrance into Jerusalem and we proclaim the Passion of the Lord according to Matthew
- The Chrism Mass at the Cathedral (Tuesday evening, 7:00 p.m. at the Cathedral): Priests renew their promises of priestly service to our diocesan church (Diocese of Covington) and the Holy Oils that will be used this year are consecrated: The Oil of the Sick, The Oil of the Catechumens, and The Sacred Chrism).
- Holy Thursday (Pot luck supper at 6:00 p.m., Mass begins at 7:30 p.m. at Saint Agnes): We commemorate the Institution of the Eucharist (the Mass). We recall that Jesus washed His disciples feet, and so we should wash the feet (serve) of others. Eucharistic Adoration in the Mass chapel until midnight.
- Good Friday (Services at noon and repeated at 7:00 p.m., Stations at 1:30 p.m.): We proclaim the Passion of the Lord according to John, offer special prayers for the peoples of the world, venerate the Cross and receive Holy Communion.
- Easter Vigil (at 8:30 p.m. Saturday evening): We Bless the new fire; Proclaim the beautiful *Exultet*; Recall Salvation History through readings, responsorials and prayers; Celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation, and; Celebrate the Eucharist.

Holy Father’s Good Friday Collection

The Holy Father’s Good Friday Collection is also known as the Pontifical Good Friday Collection. In short, this collection helps to sustain Christianity in the Holy Land. The Franciscans and others in the Holy Land...

“minister in parishes, provide formation and education, build homes and feed the hungry. The sacred shrines in the Holy Land are maintained so pilgrims can walk in the footsteps of Jesus. And in these times of war and instability, we provide humanitarian aid.”

As you might well imagine, it is not easy being a Christian in the Holy Land and historically it really never has been, even going back to Saint Paul, who himself took up a collection to support the Christians in the Holy Land.

What are some of the specifics? Last year’s collection:

- Supported 29 parishes, 4 homes of orphans, 3 academic institutions
- Helped keep schools open for over 10,000 pre-K through grade 12 students
- Supported 120 men preparing to be priests or brothers
- Helped rehabilitate 80 homes for Christian families
- Provided senior care facilities in Bethlehem and Nazareth
- Created 1,500 jobs in the Holy Land for Christians
- Preserved 54 shrines connected with the life of Jesus and the prophets

Parishioners who receive their offertory envelopes in the mail should have a special envelope for this collection in their packet. If you do not use the offertory envelopes and would like to support this special collection, taken up each year on Good Friday, simply clearly identify your donation as being for the “Holy Land Collection.” Checks should be made out to Saint Agnes, and please note “Holy Land” on the notation line of your check. Thank you.
