Ordination Class: 1953

As mentioned in previous bulletins and in this edition, our Father James E. Quill has now reached his 65th or “Sapphire” anniversary/jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood in service to the Diocese of Covington. He was ordained on May 30, 1953. In fact, he said his First Mass (now usually called “Mass of Thanksgiving”) here at Saint Agnes on May 31, 1953. The Ordination Class of 1953 must have been exceptional. In total, three are still living and ministering in service to our diocese. In addition to Father Quill, there is Father Albert Ruschman who resides at Saint Thomas Parish Rectory, Fort Thomas and like Father Quill at Saint Agnes, helps with Masses and other Sacraments there and elsewhere. And there is Father Robert Rosing who currently lives at Saint Charles Community on Farrell Drive and says Mass there and with the Sisters of Notre Dame, Saint Joseph Heights. Between the three of them, there are 195 years of service to the Church of Covington. All three have had a number of differing assignments over the years.

I have had the privilege of being assigned with all three of these priests. When I was first ordained, I was assigned (1984-1987) to Saint Catherine Parish in Fort Thomas, where Father Ruschman was then pastor. I was very fortunate to have Father Ruschman as my pastor in my first assignment and I learned much from him, particularly by his example, his gentleness and his prayerfulness. I enjoyed living and working with him those three years.

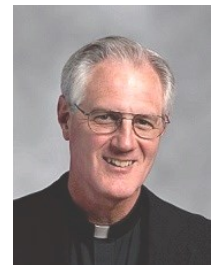
When I was assigned to Saint Benedict’s Parish in Covington (1993-1999) as pastor, Father Rosing lived in the rectory there for a couple years, serving as a chaplain to Saint Elizabeth North Hospital, when it was on 20th Street. Father Rosing also helped with Mass and Sacraments at Saint Benedict’s and also Our Savior Parish. I learned a lot from Father Rosing’s compassionate example as well.

I have had two assignments with Father Quill. I was associate pastor (now called “parochial

vicar”) for two years (1991-1993) with Father Quill as my pastor, at Saint Joseph Parish, Crescent Springs. And now at Saint Agnes, I have lived with and worked with Father Quill for 19 of the 24 years that he has been in residence here after his “retirement.” As you know, Father Quill helps out considerably with the Masses, other Sacraments and other activities of our parish. He is also very good to share the rectory with and he has always given me good advice when I’ve asked him. Father Quill has achieved a kind of beloved *pater familia* (head of the family) status at Saint Agnes. He is a great blessing to our parish.

I congratulate all three of these priests on reaching their 65th Jubilee. I am grateful for all of their thoughtfulness and efforts to be good and holy priests over the long haul. I am also grateful for having the opportunity to learn from them and benefit from their example. They have been and continue to be a great blessing to the Church of Covington. God bless them!

Next Sunday: June 10, 2018

Tenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle B

In our Liturgical Calendar we are now in the period called "Ordinary Time." The season is called "Ordinary" because it is "ordinated," that is, counted: second Sunday, third Sunday, etc. The Liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green, unless there is a special feast.

This year we are using the "Cycle B" readings, and so our Gospel reading this year will feature the Gospel of Mark. During Ordinary Time the first reading is from the Old Testament and is chosen because of a thematic relation to the Gospel reading. For the second reading, we read semi-continuously from a New Testament letter, currently Saint Paul's Second Letter to the Church at Corinth (2 Corinthians).

Gospel Reading (Mark 3:20-35): As you can see, this reading is toward the beginning of Mark's description of Jesus' public ministry. From this description, we can already see that Jesus is becoming a controversial figure, not only with the "scribes from Jerusalem" who were no doubt sent by even higher religious authorities in Jerusalem, but also even within His family. Jesus' family declares that "He is out of His mind" and the scribes accuse Him of being in cahoots with the devil. We then hear a scriptural basis of the adage, "United we stand, divided we fall." Jesus then declares that all sins will be forgiven, except for blasphemy against the Holy Spirit, which He seems to be accusing the scribes of since they ascribe to Jesus an "unclean spirit." Of course, the only "spirit" that Jesus has is the Holy Spirit. The reading concludes with Jesus declaring that "whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."

First Reading (Genesis 3:9-15): As a counterpoint to what is the conclusion of the Gospel today ("...whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."), we hear the result of Adam and Eve NOT doing the will of God, and the pain and suffering in human life that have resulted from that disobedience. The reading concludes with a reference to the offspring of the woman (Eve) who

will "strike at your (the serpent's) head." This is sometimes referred to as the *Proto evangelium*, or the first announcement of the Gospel in that "offspring" is a reference to a coming Messiah, Jesus Christ. So from the very beginning after Adam and Eve's disobedience to the will of God, God was working to heal the wound (bring salvation) inflicted by the obedience of Jesus to His father's will.

Second Reading (2 Corinthians 4:13-5:1):

This passage, or parts of it are often chosen to be read at funerals. In this passage Saint Paul teaches "knowing that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and place us with you in His presence." Then Saint Paul encourages with the hopeful words: "Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather, although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal."

Saint of the Week

Saint Boniface

On June 5th we celebrate Saint Boniface, the patron saint of Germany, brewers, World Youth Day and Fulda, a town almost exactly in the center of Germany. Yet he was not born in Germany. He was English by birth, born in approximately AD 675, in Exeter or Crediton, both in Devonshire. His name originally was Winfrid, Wynfrith or Wynfryth. He studied under the Benedictines, then taught school and at the age of 30 became a priest. When the abbot of his monastery died he was asked to take his place but Boniface decided instead to go as a missionary to the Frisians, (people who lived on the north coast of Holland and Germany). The Frisians were at war with Charles Martel, the grandfather of Charlemagne, so Boniface returned to England. The next year he returned to Europe and went to Rome where Pope Gregory II named him after Boniface of Tarsus and named him the missionary bishop of Germania.



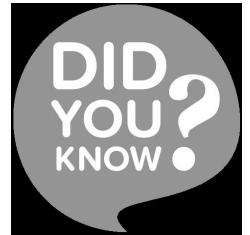
In Germany Boniface cut down an oak tree that the Germans worshipped. As he was cutting it a wind came up and blew it down, and as the pagan God did not strike down Boniface, the conversions in Germany began. He Baptized thousands of Germans and also formed an alliance with the Carolingians (Charles Martel's family) that helped in his missionary work by their support. In 754 he returned to Frisia to complete the work that brought him to Europe originally but was killed by a group of robbers.

He is celebrated across Germany and honored in England as well. Legend also credits Boniface with beginning the Christmas tree tradition. This information barely scratches the surface about this interesting and important saint. You are encouraged to read more about him online or at your library or local Catholic bookstore.

Did You Know?

Fr. Quill entered the seminary at the young age of 15. After six years of studying at Saint Gregory Seminary in Cincinnati and Saint Paul Seminary in Minnesota, he was ordained on May 30, 1953. He then went on to Saint Patrick's College in Maynooth, Ireland and earned a doctorate in theology in 1957.



Upon his arrival back in the states, he was placed at Holy Cross Parish as an Associate Pastor and a teacher at the High School for one year. He went on to work at the Diocese of Covington Chancery while teaching theology and philosophy at Saint Pius Seminary and Villa Madonna College (currently known as Thomas More). He then was assigned his first Pastor role at Saint Paul Parish in Florence. After six years, he was reassigned to Blessed Sacrament for seven years, and his final Pastor position was at Saint Joseph Parish in Crescent Springs before retiring in 1994. Since then he has been a retired priest in residence at Saint Agnes and has assisted with the chaplain duties at St. Elizabeth Hospital until a couple of years ago. During his priesthood, he has served under five bishops.

When asked what has been his favorite part about being a priest, Fr. Quill replied, "the ability to serve the people and make lifelong friendships along the way." Based on that response, it's not surprising that celebrating Sunday Mass is his favorite Sacrament, especially here at Saint Agnes. He has found the parishioners here to be very friendly and generous with their time and treasure. He makes it a point to visit the school children weekly and enjoys teasing them

but more importantly listening to them.

Thank you Fr. Quill for bringing our children into the church, sustaining their souls with the Sacraments, presiding at marriages, listening to us at our worst moments when we are anxious, upset or on our death bed, and thank you most of all for bringing Christ Himself into our lives. Happy 65th Anniversary of your priestly ordination Fr. Quill!!

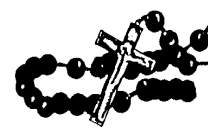

Virtus

For Those Interested in Volunteering

5. Once all of the above is done and the Diocese processes your forms, you will receive an email stating your account is now "active" and you will be able to volunteer.



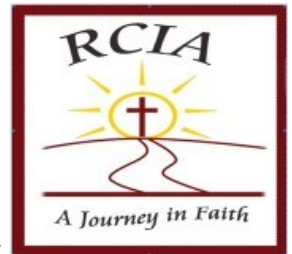
