Dear Friends

It's time to share another email that was received by my wife and I from one of her cousins. I think it's very timely considering the readings we have had during this recent Easter Season.

There were 2 brothers living on adjoining farms, who fell into conflict. It was their first serious rift in over 40 years of farming side by side, sharing machinery and trading labor and goods as needed without a hitch. Then the long collaboration fell apart. It began with a small misunderstanding, and grew into a major difference and finally, it exploded into an exchange of bitter words followed by weeks of silence.

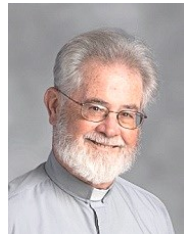
One morning there was a knock on John's door. He opened it to find a man with a carpenter's toolbox. "I'm looking for a few days work" he said. "Perhaps you would have a few small jobs here and there I could help with? Could I help you?" "Yes," said the older brother. "I do have a job for you. Look across the creek at the farm. That's my neighbor. In fact it's my younger brother! Last week there was a meadow between us. He recently took his bulldozer to the river levee and now there is a creek between us. Well, he may have done this to spite me, but I'll do him one better. See that pile of lumber by the barn? I want you to build me a fence, an 8 foot fence so I won't need to see his place or his face anymore." The carpenter said, "I think I understand the situation. Show me the nails and the post-hole digger and I'll be able to do a job that pleases you."

The older brother had to go to town so he helped the carpenter get the materials ready and then he was off for the day. The carpenter worked hard all that day - measuring, sawing and nailing. About sunset when the farmer returned, the carpenter had just finished his job. The farmer's eyes opened wide, his jaw dropped. There was no fence at all. It was a bridge. A bridge that stretched from one side of the creek to the other!

The 2 brothers stood at each end of the bridge, and then they met in the middle, taking each other's hand. They turned to see the carpenter hoist his tool box on his shoulder. "I'd love to stay on" the carpenter said, "but I have many more bridges to build."

Remember this—God won't ask what kind of car you drove, but He'll ask how many people you helped get where they needed to go. God won't ask the square footage of your house, but He'll ask how many people you welcomed into your home. God won't ask about the clothes you had in your closet, but He'll ask how many you helped to clothe. God won't ask how many friends you had, but He'll ask how many people to whom you were a friend. God won't ask about the color of your skin, but He'll ask about the content of your character. God won't ask why it took you so long to seek Salvation, but He'll lovingly take you to your mansion in Heaven, and not to the gates of Hell.

Next Sunday: June 17, 2018
The 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time,
Cycle B

In our Liturgical Calendar we are now in the period called "Ordinary Time". The season is called ordinary because it is ordained, that is, counted: second Sunday, third Sunday, etc. The Liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green, unless there is a special feast.

This year we are using Cycle B, and so our Gospel reading this year will feature the Gospel of Mark. During Ordinary Time the first reading, from the Old Testament, is chosen because of a thematic relation to the Gospel reading. For the second reading, we read semi-continuously from a New Testament letter, currently the Second Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians.

Gospel Reading (Mark 4:26-34): In this reading Jesus uses parables to teach about the Kingdom of God. The first is a parable about how a man might sow seed on the land, and then the seed sprouts and grows and produces grain, essentially all on its own, "the man knows not how." This image gives the impression of the Kingdom of God as an unstoppable process beyond man's control. Jesus then uses the parable of the mustard seed to illustrate how the Kingdom of God starts small (a very small seed) to become the largest of plants where the birds of the air can dwell in its shade.

First Reading (Ezekiel 17:22-24): Ezekiel received his call and ministered to the Jewish people while they were in exile in Babylon 550 years before Jesus was born. Much of Ezekiel's ministry was directed toward keeping the people's hopes alive during this low point in their history. Isaiah spoke of how "a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse" indicating that the line of King David would be reestablished (Jesse was King David's Father). In this passage, Ezekiel uses a similar sort of image, a shoot taken from the crest of a cedar tree, that will be planted on a "high and lofty mountain" (Mt. Zion?). And this tree (the Davidic line) shall put forth branches and bear fruit, and birds shall dwell beneath it. (Cf. the mustard seed parable in the Gospel today.)

Second Reading (2 Corinthians 5:6-10): This reading is a passage from a larger section in which Saint Paul reflects on the meaning of all of the hardships he has known and continues to endure for the sake of the Gospel and for Christ. (Passages from this larger section are often used at funerals.) He speaks longingly of finally being with Christ: "we [Paul] would rather leave the body and go home to the Lord."

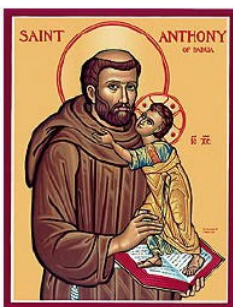

Saint of the Week

Saint Anthony of Padua



Have you ever said, "Anthony, Anthony turn around, something's lost and can't be found."? If you have then you were asking this week's saint for help. Who is he? He is Saint Anthony of Padua. Saint Anthony was born Fernando Martins de Bulhões in Lisbon, Portugal on August 15, 1195. He entered an

Augustinian monastery at the age of 15 and studied theology and Latin and was later ordained to the priesthood. He became the monastery's hospitality master, and while there he met some Franciscans. Their simple lifestyle appealed to him and he sought to be released from the Augustinians. He joined the Franciscans at the hermitage in Olivias, Portugal and then tried to get to Morocco where the Moslems had killed other Franciscans. He did not make it. After he left he became ill and on the way back his ship was blown to Sicily by a storm. From there he went to Tuscany and joined a Franciscan convent there. His health still remained poor.

Anthony was famous as a preacher and he became one by accident, or more likely by an act of the Holy Spirit. At an ordination some Dominicans came to help celebrate. Since Dominicans are an order of preachers it was assumed that one of them would give the homily, but they demurred because they had not prepared. Anthony was called upon to speak, being told to say whatever the Holy Spirit put in his mouth. His eloquence and learning impressed everyone.

Now at this time Saint Francis of Assisi was still alive and he had a distrust of theological learning, believing it might compromise the order's life of poverty. Saint Francis was so taken by Saint Anthony's zeal for the Franciscan way of life that he made him the instructor for those in the order seeking ordination. Saint Anthony also taught at several universities in France and was later the Franciscan envoy to the Vatican where Pope Gregory IX called his preaching the "jewel case of the Bible." The Pope also called him the "Ark of the Testament."

In 1231 he became ill with Ergotism (a disease caused by fungus on rye and other grains which causes convulsions and gangrenous symptoms). He died on June 13, 1231 at the age of 35. He is buried at Padua where there is a Basilica in his honor. He was canonized on May 30, 1232 (the second fastest canonization in history, the fastest was for Peter of Verona). Anthony was named a Doctor of the Church (an honor given to those whose writings are of particular theological value to the Church).

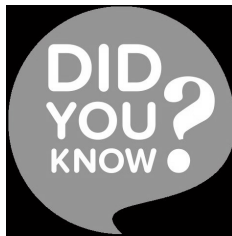
Saint of the Week continued

So how did Anthony become the finder of lost articles? Once he had a Psalter that was very important to him. It went missing and he prayed that it be returned. The person who had taken it (or stolen it) had left the Franciscans, but was moved to return it and to rejoin the order. There is much more to learn about this famous saint and his writings, which can be found online, at your library or at your local Catholic bookstore.

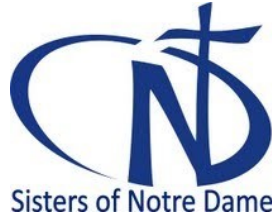
