### Paraclete

Today, this first Sunday following last week's Pentecost Sunday, we celebrate the Most Holy Trinity, the unity of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit in the singular person of God. The reality of this union may be the single most difficult aspect of God for most people to grasp or understand and, in this union, the role of the Holy Spirit is probably least understood.

We know that our ultimate goal is life in and with the Father. We also clearly know that Jesus, His only begotten Son, is the way to achieving that goal. The role of the Spirit is to interpret and bear witness to Jesus and His revelation of the Father. Consequently, I think many Catholics and many Christians seem to not fully grasp the role of the Holy Spirit and seem to relegate to Him a "minor" role or position in the Trinity; but, the Spirit is essential to our salvation.

Jesus promised to send the Spirit to help us and to guide us: *"If you love Me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and He will give you another Paraclete (Advocate)\* to be with you always, the Spirit of Truth,\* which the world cannot accept, because it neither sees nor knows it. But you know it, because it remains with you, and will be in you."* (John 14:15-17) This "Paraclete" is the Holy Spirit.

The Paraclete is described by many different words trying to capture the many different roles that he plays: Advocate, Helper, Counselor, Comforter, Intercessor, Spirit of Truth. The word I like best is "Ally" because Jesus said the Paraclete will be with us always.

Ally also reflects the meaning of the word Paraclete derived from its etymology. It comes to us via late Latin from Greek *paraklētos* 'called in aid,' from *para-* 'alongside' + *klētos* (from *kalein* 'to call'). In other words we call upon Him to walk along beside us as we go along our faith journey to the Father by following the teaching and example of His son. Is that not what an ally does?

I also like the word ally because it denotes a personal relationship, a fellowship; each party is

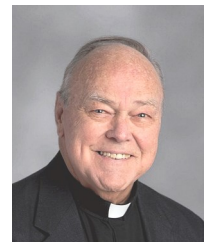
invested in the wellbeing of the other. We are often admonished to develop a personal relationship with the Father and the son; but you do not as often hear that with regard to the Holy Spirit. It is in this personal relationship that the Spirit gives us His 7 gifts: *wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord*. We receive these seven gifts at Baptism, and they are strengthened at Confirmation so that we can proclaim the truths of the faith.

If we diligently utilize the gifts of the Holy spirit in our daily lives, we will reap our rewards in the 12 fruits of the holy spirit: *charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, generosity, gentleness, faithfulness, modesty, self-control, chastity*.

It behooves us to work at developing a deep personal relationship with the Holy Spirit, our Paraclete, just as we work at enhancing our personal relationship with our Father and with Jesus. That deepened relationship will embolden us to (as Pope Francis has encouraged us) "get out of our comfort zone" and profess our faith and share our faith with those around us. We can do this with the strength of knowledge that our Paraclete, our ally, is there to support us.

In closing, as stated in today's Second Reading; "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with all of you."

### **Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, Cycle A, Ordinary Time**

In our current Liturgical Calendar, the second Sunday after Pentecost is the Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. This calendar combines what used to be two separate feasts—the Feast of Corpus Christi and the Feast of the Precious Blood of Christ—into a single celebration, emphasizing the unity of the Body and Blood (the Host and the Cup) of Christ.

**Gospel Reading (John 6:51-58):** This Gospel reading is from a section of John's Gospel called the "Bread of Life Discourse." It is found in John, chapter 6. Unlike the other Gospels, John gives a developed teaching about the Eucharist. This developed teaching is an indicator that John's Gospel was written later than the other Gospels. This particular reading reflects a technique used quite often in John's Gospel, where a group of listeners understands an image Jesus uses to teach on a very literal level, whereas those enlightened by faith would understand the truer/deeper meaning of the image. "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is My flesh for the life of the world." Jesus' listeners question how He can give them His flesh to eat. Rather than soften the image or change it, Jesus instead seems to use it even more graphically: "Amen, Amen I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For My flesh is true food, and My blood is true drink..." The Catholic Church's teaching on the "Real Presence" of Christ in the Eucharist finds great support from this Scriptural passage.

**First Reading (Deuteronomy 8:2-3,14-16):** This reading is from a speech of Moses, given to the Israelites as they prepare to enter the Promised

Land. He will not be going with them. He reminds them of what God has done for them and urges them not to forget. With the emphasis given to the Manna ("bread from heaven"), this reading's connection to today's feast is obvious. Moses speaks to his people of the necessity of learning that "not by bread alone does one live, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of the Lord." Jesus is "God's Word made flesh" and so for us, the Eucharist (the Body and Blood of Christ) is "God's Word" feeding us Sacramentally.

**Second Reading (1 Corinthians 10:16-17):** In this reading Paul speaks of the unifying nature of the "cup of blessing" and the "bread that we break." Both are a "participation" in the Body and Blood of Christ. The Eucharist nourishes the unity of the body of Christ: "Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf." The Eucharist should be a sign and a source of growth in unity among Christians.

### **Corpus Christi Procession**

Next Sunday is the Feast of The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, or *Corpus Christi* as it is also known by. After the 11:30 a.m. Mass, we will have a procession with the Blessed Sacrament from the main church to The Divine Mercy Eucharistic Adoration Chapel in our convent building. These processions are a joyful part of our parish's local traditions. We look forward to observing the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of our Divine Mercy Adoration Chapel in January. That's twenty years of people praying before the Lord in the Most Blessed Sacrament. Please plan to participate in the procession.

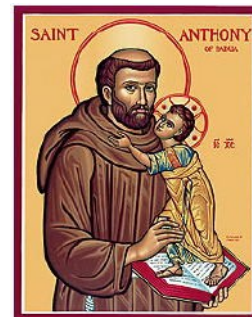

## Saint of the Week

### Saint Anthony of Padua

Have you ever said, “Anthony, Anthony turn around, something's lost and can't be found.”? If you have then you were asking this week's saint for help. Who is he? He is Saint Anthony of Padua. Saint Anthony was born Fernando Matins de Bulhões in Lisbon, Portugal on August 15, 1195.



He entered an Augustinian monastery at the age of 15 and studied theology and Latin and was later ordained to the priesthood. He became the monastery's hospitality master, and while there he met some Franciscans. Their simple lifestyle appealed to him and he sought to be released from the Augustinians. He joined the Franciscans at the hermitage in Olivias, Portugal and then tried to get to Morocco where the Moslems had killed other Franciscans. He did not make it. After he left he became ill and on the way back his ship was blown to Sicily by a storm. From there he went to Tuscany and joined a Franciscan convent there. His health still remained poor.

Anthony was famous as a preacher and he became one by accident, or more likely by an act of the Holy Spirit. At an ordination some Dominicans came to help celebrate. Since Dominicans are an order of preachers it was assumed that one of them would give the homily, but they demurred because they had not prepared. Anthony was called upon to speak, being told to say whatever the Holy Spirit put in his mouth. His eloquence and learning impressed everyone.

Now at this time Saint Francis of Assisi was still alive and he had a distrust of theological learning believing it might compromise the order's life of poverty. Saint Francis was so taken by Saint Anthony's zeal for the Franciscan way of life that he made him the instructor for those in the order seeking ordination. Saint Anthony also taught at several universities in France and was later the Franciscan envoy to the Vatican where Pope Gregory IX called his preaching the “jewel case of

the Bible.” The Pope also called him the “Ark of the Testament.”

In 1231 he became ill with Ergotism (a disease caused by fungus on rye and other grains which causes convulsions and gangrenous symptoms). He died on June 13, 1231 at the age of 35. He is buried at Padua where there is a Basilica in his honor. He was canonized on May 30, 1232 (the second fastest canonization in history, the fastest was for Peter of Verona). Anthony was named a Doctor of the Church (an honor given to those whose writings are of particular theological value to the Church).

So how did Anthony become the finder of lost articles? Once he had a Psalter that was very important to him. It went missing and he prayed that it be returned. The person who had taken it (or stolen it) had left the Franciscans, but was moved to return it and to rejoin the order. There is much more to learn about this famous saint and his writings, which can be found online, at your library or at your local Catholic bookstore.

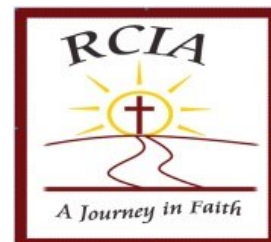

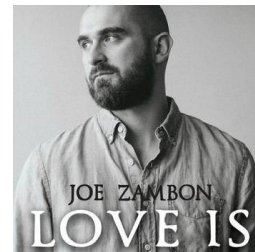

4. Contact Msgr. Don Enzweiler at the Parish Office to set up a 15 minute meeting. He will give you two forms that you need to complete.
5. Once all of the above is done and the Diocese processes your forms, you will receive an email stating your account is now "active" and you will be able to volunteer.
6. To remain "active" you will be required to read a monthly bulletin and answer a question regarding the bulletin.
