Trusting God

Six weeks ago when I wrote my last article, I had just fallen down the stairs at my home and was looking at an operation to reattach some tendons in my right leg. During the last six weeks I have witnessed the generosity and love of all of you towards me. I have received everything from prayers and cards, to help with things around my house by parish members. Although I believed that Christians would act in this manner, I was taken aback by the reality of the love that was shown me.

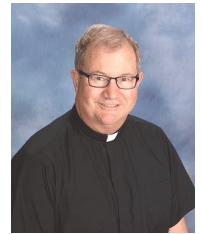
I learned that to trust in God is to let go of the need to control life. Letting go is hard to do, especially for people of my generation and my gender. We are taught to be self-reliant and to do things on our own. We are taught to take care of things for ourselves. This is not always possible. Sometimes things happen that are beyond our control and the only option available is to let the need to control go and rely on God.

Quite often letting go and relying on God means to let others do things for you. Again, this may be hard to do. It is hard for some people to ask for help. One of those people is me. I found out though, that letting others help, has helped me to see the hand of God in the actions of others and it has allowed them the opportunity to be of service also. I believe that we both were blessed from this but my blessing was the greater because I was able to see how much others cared about me. Learning this was a truly humbling experience. This would not have happened if I had not been forced to let go of my need to control things.

In today's reading we have Zechariah, the father of John the Baptist, who finished a period of time in his life when he had to let go of what he perceived to be possible. Gabriel had come to him and told him that he and his wife Elizabeth would have a child in their old age, but Zechariah did not believe him. He could not let go and let God accomplish what he intended to do. As such he was struck dumb until the birth occurred.

God asks us to trust Him all of the time. Sometimes it is in great miracles such as the pregnancy of a barren woman and sometimes it is in trusting Him that you will be OK. Each is an opportunity to trust in the power and love of our God.

Faith Sharing Questions

Theme of this week's Gospel: The life of John the Baptist and his birth and the life and birth of Jesus are alike in several ways. Both were chosen from the moment of their conception, both received names from an angel and both came out of the desert!

Adults: Do you think Elizabeth and Zechariah understood what role their son was to have in the life of Jesus? Do you ever think about what role your children and grandchildren will play in their world today?

Teens: If you were asked to pick a saint to imitate and be your role model, would you ever think of John the Baptist? Why or why not?

Children: If you were alive when John the Baptist was, would you have picked him to be one of your friends? Why or why not?

Next Sunday: July 1, 2018 The 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle B

In our Liturgical Calendar we are now in the period called "Ordinary Time." The season is called ordinary because it is unadorned, that is, uncounted: second Sunday, third Sunday, etc. The Liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green, unless there is a special feast.

This year we are using Cycle B, and so our Gospel reading this year will feature the Gospel of Mark. During Ordinary Time the first reading, from the Old Testament, is chosen because of a thematic relation to the Gospel reading. For the second reading, we read semi-continuously from a New Testament letter, currently the Second Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians.

Gospel Reading (Mark 5:21-43): This reading is a very dramatic one. The overall story is one of a synagogue official (Jairus by name) urgently pleading with Jesus to come heal his daughter: "My daughter is at the point of death. Please, come lay your hands on her that she may get well and live."

On the way to Jairus' daughter, a woman who has been ill for many years believes that she will be healed if she but touches Jesus' cloak. She comes up behind Jesus and touches his cloak and is in fact healed. Jesus senses what has happened and asks: "Who has touched my clothes?" In fear, the woman approaches Jesus. Jesus reassures her that her faith has saved her.

Jesus arrives too late to Jairus' home to heal his daughter, for she has died. Jesus says to Jairus: "Do not be afraid, just have faith." Jesus then raises Jairus' daughter from the dead.

This reading develops the theme of the faith in Jesus that leads to answered prayers and to life.

First Reading (Wisdom 1:13-15,2:23-24): In this reading, the author of the Book of Wisdom ponders the mystery of death in the midst of a Creation that is entirely from the hand of a God who intends nothing destructive: "God did not make death, nor does he rejoice in the destruction of the living..." In fact, God has "formed man to be imperishable; the image of His own nature he made him." The mystery of death and suffering is one that humans still ponder.

Second Reading (2 Corinthians 8:7,9,13-15): In this passage, Paul encourages the Church at Corinth to be generous now to those in need, so that when they (the Corinthians) are in need, others will be able to be generous toward them. Paul reminds the Corinthians: "For you know the gracious act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, for your sake he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich."

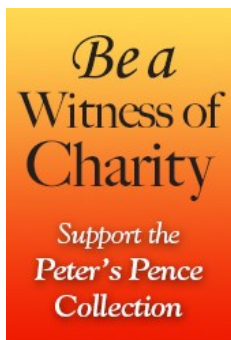

doing so was able to speak again. It was there that he spoke the beautiful "Canticle of Zechariah" (Luke 1 67-79). This is the day we celebrate on June 24th.

This solemnity has long been associated with the summer solstice but its date was not selected because of the solstice, but because of its location in relation to Christmas. In the Middle Ages the Julian calendar was used and in it the solstice general occurred in the middle of June. It was only with the adoption of the Gregorian calendar in 1582 (and later in some areas of Europe) that the solstice occurred on June 21st.

The eve of Nativity of Saint John the Baptist has been celebrated in many parts of Europe with bonfires and because of its closeness to the summer solstice it was considered a "charmed" holiday, when treasures could be easily found, divining rods for finding water were cut and herbs were given special healing powers. Some herbs associated with this date are Saint John's Wort which was believed to repel evil, Yarrow which had healing powers and the tiny spores of the bracken fern would make you invisible if you gathered it on this day when the spores were visible. It has a dark side also, being a kind of summer version of Halloween with witches and other nefarious creatures roaming about. Children went about and demanded treats too. It was to celebrate the eve of this day that the Russian composer Modest Mussorgsky wrote *Night on Bald Mountain*, which you may know from Disney's movie *Fantasia* (in this musical piece the evil spirits vanish at the sound of the morning church bell).

The Nativity of Saint John the Baptist is celebrated all over the world and in many different ways. You are encouraged to find out more about this day online or at your local library.

Saint of the Week

Nativity of Saint John the Baptist



June 24th is unique in the church calendar because it celebrates the date of the birth of a saint rather than the death of the saint. This only occurs one other time in the calendar and that is with the birth of the Virgin Mary, which occurs on September 8th (we

celebrate the birth of Christ also but He is not a saint, He is much more.). This solemnity is 6 months before Christmas because when the angel Gabriel spoke to the Virgin Mary at the Annunciation he told her that her cousin Elizabeth was 6 months pregnant. As we know, Mary went with haste to assist her in her pregnancy. This is one of the oldest celebrations of the Church and has been celebrated since 458. Like Christmas it traditionally had three Masses, a Vigil Mass, a Mass at Dawn and a midday Mass.

We should recall that Zechariah had been struck dumb for doubting the angel's message that his elderly wife would bear a child. On the day the child was born Zechariah wrote that his name would be John as the angel had told him and in

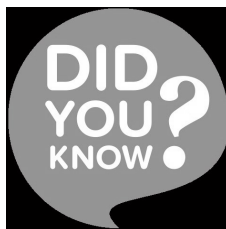

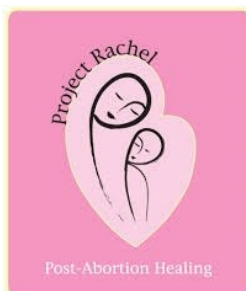
