Prophets in Our Midst??

“But you shall say to them:
Thus says the LORD GOD!
And whether they heed or resist—
for they are a rebellious house—
they shall know that a
prophet has been among them.”

As I see this quote in our First Reading, I think of how many things spoken of in the Bible that are now just attributed to science. Yet, in the book of Genesis we read of God creating and setting nature into place; we also see the great flood; in Exodus we see the plagues...throughout the Old Testament we see warnings and punishment through nature for mankind's sins. How do all those instances relate to that quote? It is the fact we may know too late that a prophet has been with us. We seem to forget God in the scheme of our life. I am not saying our God is a cruel god, inflicting pain and death on the innocent. Nor am I saying all who died by any natural disasters were sinners. I call us to remember mankind has been given rule over the earth and all living things. How has that rule been carried out? Are we not, sometimes, the reason disasters are happening? Check your science.

In the Gospel we hear Jesus say, “A prophet is not without honor except in his native place and among his own kin and in his own house.’ So He was not able to perform any mighty deed there, apart from curing a few sick people by laying His hands on them. He was amazed at their lack of faith.”

Knowing truth from falsehood is often difficult in today's world. We tend to go to the quickest place to get “answers.” We have a lot of “knowledgeable sources.” I used to tell students that they could start at Wikipedia, but they needed to remember anyone can put information in there, even the student next to them. That seems to happen more and more in our media/technology-based society today. Digging deeper gets more truth and facts.

As a parent of grown children, I chuckle also as I read this passage. Moms and Dads can all

relate to being prophets not “honored in their native home,” especially when the kids are in their teen years. Frequently I welcome eighth grade parents to the point in their lives when they know “nothing.” I encourage them that after about 10 years they will hear their children tell them they were right and as kids they should have listened.

Jesus was amazed at the lack of faith His native home had in His message. What about today? What draws people not to believe in the true God? Are we missing out on the mighty deeds Our Lord could perform for us? What takes our time? What ARE we putting our faith into?

In the last couple of years, Saint Agnes has given gifts of books and *Formed*. These offer opportunities of spending short times with God. It is amazing how giving a few minutes of quiet with Our Lord's words can cause us to hunger for more. Take some time from the world of today; unplug, turn off, sit in the quiet of nature and listen for God to share His love with you.

Next Sunday: July 15, 2018
The 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time,
Cycle B

In our Liturgical Calendar we are now in the period called “Ordinary Time”. The season is called “ordinary” because it is ordained, that is, counted: second Sunday, third Sunday, etc. The Liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green, unless there is a special feast.

This year we are using Cycle B, and so our Gospel reading this year will feature the Gospel of Mark. During Ordinary Time the first reading, from the Old Testament, is chosen because of a thematic relation to the Gospel reading. For the second reading, we read semi-continuously from a New Testament letter, currently the letter of Saint Paul to the Church at Ephesus.

Gospel Reading (Mark 6:7-13): This Gospel passage describes Jesus sending the Twelve out to preach. The sense of urgency is palpable. The Twelve are instructed to make no provision for their material needs: “take nothing for the journey but a walking stick – no food, no sack, no money in their belts...” The results of their mission are described very succinctly. This succinctness is a characteristic of the Gospel of Mark. Scholars suggest that the urgency (and succinctness) in the Gospel of Mark is indicative of the belief held at the time that the Gospel of Mark was written (65-70 AD), that Jesus would return soon and usher in His kingdom. No doubt the increasing tensions between the Jewish People and their Roman occupiers would have added greatly to the sense of impending turmoil, foreboding and change. (Jerusalem in fact was destroyed by the Romans in 70 AD.)

First Reading (Amos 7:12-15): After the death of King Solomon, the Jewish nation split into two kingdoms, one to the north and the other to the south. The Northern Kingdom was called “Israel” or “Ephraim” and its capital was Samaria. The Southern Kingdom was called “Judah.” Jerusalem and the Temple were located in Judah. This is about 800 years before Jesus. Amos was a prophet in the Northern Kingdom. The Northern

Kingdom was at odds with the Southern Kingdom (where the Temple was located) and so had set up a “Temple” of its own for worship in Bethel. It was a time of great material prosperity for many in the North, but also of great deprivation for the poorest people, who often were taken advantage of by the wealthy. Amos, in God’s name, tried to raise the consciousness of the people to not take advantage of the poor, but rather to care for them. Apparently some of the priests of Bethel, such as Amaziah (featured in this reading) were allied with the wealthy and wished to banish Amos to the Southern Kingdom (Judah). In this reading, Amos, attempting to justify his vocation as prophet, describes to Amaziah, how it is that he became a prophet: “The Lord took me from following the flock, and said to me, Go prophesy to my people Israel.”

Second Reading (Ephesians 1:3-14): This reading is from the beginning of the Letter to the Ephesians. In a rather poetic style, Paul describes the plan of God for all of Creation, a plan that from the beginning naturally involves all who would be the Church of God, including the people who are the church at Ephesus... and much later, the Church in Fort Wright, KY.

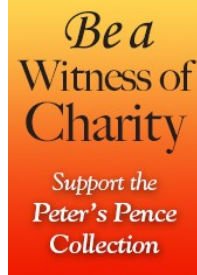

Saint of the Week

Catherine (Kateri) Tekakwitha



Native Americans, particularly those in the eastern half of North America, had their old cultures disrupted by the coming of the Europeans. As they came into contact with Europeans they had changes to the clothes they wore, the weapons they used and to their health. Not being immune to many common European diseases the Native American population suffered great losses to various diseases. To make up for this the tribes

embarked on what are called "Mourning Wars." These wars were designed to get captives from other tribes to replace those who had died. Women and children in particular were taken. The Iroquois Confederacy was a group of tribes in New York made up of the Mohawks, Oneidas, Onondagas, Cayuga, Seneca and the Tuscarora.

Kateri Tekakwitha was born in 1657 in the Mohawk village of Ossernenon, about 40 miles west of Albany, New York. Her mother was a Catholic of the Huron tribe who had been captured by the Mohawks in one of the Mourning Wars and her father was a Mohawk chief. Between 1661 and 1663 the Mohawks suffered from a smallpox epidemic. Kateri lost her younger brother and parents. She also had smallpox and was left with smallpox scars and impaired sight. She was adopted by her aunt's family. Because of the epidemic, the Mohawks moved to a village called Caughnawaga (this name was later attached to Catholic Mohawks). Here, when she was 13, another tribe attacked the village and Kateri assisted the priest in aiding the wounded. When she was 17 her aunt decided it was time for her to marry but she refused, much to the disappointment of her family. On April 18, 1676, at the age of 19 Kateri was Baptized. (This was unusual because the Jesuit missionaries usually withheld Baptism until the convert was at the point of dying because of the possibility of apostasy.) Kateri was recognized by the Jesuits for her modesty and purity. She moved to the Jesuit mission of Kahnawake on the St. Lawrence River near Montreal.

At Kahnawake, Kateri and other Mohawk convert women practiced mortification, such as placing thorns under their sleeping mats and under their knees when they prayed. Kateri was at the mission when she died on April 17, 1680 at the age of 23 or 24. Her last words were reported to be "Jesus, I love you." She was also reported to have appeared to some of her friends right after she died. She is venerated throughout the Americas and in the Philippines. She was beatified in 1980 by Pope John Paul II and canonized in 2012 by Pope Benedict XVI. This American saint's life is full of adventure and faith. Her feast is April 17th in Canada and July 14th in the United States.
