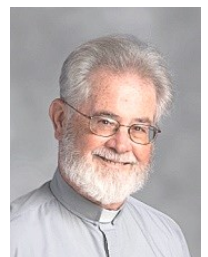

Next Sunday: July 16, 2017

15th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A

In our Liturgical Calendar we are now in the period called "Ordinary Time". The season is called "Ordinary" because it is "ordained", that is, counted: second Sunday, third Sunday, etc. The Liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green, unless there is a special feast.

This year we are using the "Cycle A" readings, and so our Gospel reading this year will feature the Gospel of Matthew. During Ordinary Time the first reading is from the Old Testament and is chosen because of a thematic relation to the Gospel reading. For the second reading, we read semi-continuously from a New Testament letter, currently Paul's Letter to the Church at Rome.

Gospel Reading (Matthew 13:1-23): In this Gospel passage Jesus tells the familiar parable of the sower who sows seed that falls on the path, on rocky ground, among thorns and on rich soil. At the end of the reading, Jesus interprets the meaning of this parable. We see that the seed represents the Word of God and the various types of soil represent various types of hearts/souls/ persons. From this parable we learn that we are called to till the soil of our hearts so that it will be a rich "soil" for the Word of God to grow in. Between the parable and its explanation, Jesus rather enigmatically explains why He teaches in

parables. We generally intuit that Jesus uses parables (simple stories) to teach greater truths. From the reading it seems that Jesus also uses parables to hide the truth, or at least provide a benchmark of sorts. Perhaps what is really being said is that unless one makes efforts to keep one's ears and eyes and heart open (keeping the soil of one's soul tilled) then even the most basic truths – such as those found in parables – will prove elusive. In other words, there is a direct relationship between hardness of heart and lack of understanding. Generosity of heart leads to enlightenment.

First Reading (Isaiah 55:10-11): This passage from Isaiah uses the image of rain for the Word of God. People, such as Isaiah, from such an arid region would have a particular appreciation for just how transforming rain is to a dry, arid land. Rain allows plants to grow and fields to turn green, providing food, and even the seed for the next planting and harvest. Just so, the Word of God can transform a human heart, a community of people and a world.

Second Reading (Romans 8:18-23): In this passage from Romans, Paul contrasts a picture of all of Creation giving birth—and so "groaning in labor pains"—to the day when all will be made right and the glory of God will be revealed in those who remain faithful witnesses. Paul is trying to encourage the Christian community at Rome by having them see their difficulties as part of the World's painful (unavoidably so because of Adam's sin) evolution toward the Kingdom—a reality that will be achieved because of Jesus' life, death and resurrection.

Saint of the Week

Saint Henry



Saint Henry was born in May 973 to a family that was related to the royal families of Germany. His father, also Henry, revolted against the Holy Roman Emperor (his cousin) and was forced into exile. Young Henry was educated by the Bishop of Freising at the Hildesheim Cathedral, receiving an ecclesiastical education. This was ordered by the emperor to insure that he would not be part of the government. When the Holy Roman Emperor died, Henry's father, after several attempts to take control of the Empire, was named Duke of Bavaria. Young Henry became the Duke at the age of 22 after his father died. His marriage to Cunigunde of Luxembourg gave him an extensive network of relations and

friends throughout western Germany.

When the succeeding Holy Roman Emperor died, Henry sought to claim the throne and did so by assuming control without the approval of the other German nobles. He became Henry II.

So why is he a saint? First, he reestablished the Diocese of Merseburg to evangelize the Slavs who were still pagan. He resolved a conflict between the Archbishop of Mainz and the Bishop of Hildesheim concerning an abbey and its property. In 1017 his wife, Cunigunde, became seriously ill. Henry vowed to found a monastery if she recovered. She did recover and Henry established a monastery at Kaufungen. When Henry died, Cunigunde went to this abbey to live until her death. He also promoted monastic reforms and enforced clerical celibacy. Perhaps the greatest contribution that Henry made was when he persuaded Pope Benedict VIII to add the phrase "Filioque" to the creed.

What is the word "filioque"? It is an important phrase in the Nicene Creed and its presence or its lack can change the meaning of the Creed. It is one of the key differences between the Eastern Orthodox and western Churches. So what is it? Well, without the filioque the Creed states that the Holy Spirit proceeds "from the Father," while with the filioque it reads that the Holy Spirit proceeds "from the Father and the Son," as we say every Sunday.

Henry died on July 13, 1024. Pope Blessed Eugenius III canonized him in 1147. Pope Innocent III canonized Cunigunde in 1200. Henry is the patron of Basel, Switzerland among other things. His feast day is July 13th and Cunigunde's feast day is March 3rd.

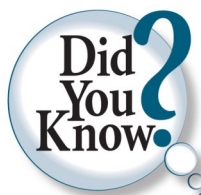

Evening Religion Classes (CCD)

Saint Agnes Evening Religion classes for children attending public schools or homeschooled are held on Mondays, 7:00 to 8:10 p.m. in the school. Our mission is to provide experience of faith and knowledge of God through teaching, witness, and service. We join in cooperation with families in supporting their goal of passing on the faith to the children.



Fees this year stay at \$50 (\$55 for non-parishioners) per child with \$130 a family as the maximum. If you have a child in the 2nd or 8th grade there is an additional \$8 fee for retreat and materials. This can be paid with registration. If anyone has difficulty with the registration fees please contact Anita Dunn at 431-1802. No child will be refused religious instruction at Saint Agnes.

Registration information should be returned by July 31st. You can place it in the collection basket or drop it off at the Parish Office. We need to be sure we have enough books or order more. If you cannot register by July 31st, please call and give your child's name and grade so they are on the class list. The registration form, calendar for the year, and the form for financial assistance can be found on our website, www.saintagnes.com. Click on Ministries then on CCD. Registration forms are also available on the bulletin boards in Church.

Fees must be paid by August 28th. Orientation night for parents and children is on September 11th at 7:00 p.m. in Church.
