The last couple of weeks have been really crazy busy. And then I looked at my schedule and there on the top of the list was bulletin article July 22nd. So what you read is what you get.

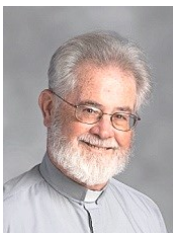

Faith Sharing Questions

Theme of this week's Gospel: Jesus called the disciples and told them to rest, but the people followed them and Jesus ministered to the crowd Himself.

Adults: Have you ever felt you were overloaded with way too much to do? What do you think is a good way to handle stress? Pray over it?...talk to a friend or counselor?...get away by yourself or maybe just cut back on some of your activities?

Teens: What causes you the most stress in your life? Is it school?...friends?...family? Is there someone you know who needs your help today in handling some stress in their life? Ask the Lord how you might help them?

Children: Jesus felt sorry for the people who were following the disciples and decided to minister to them Himself so that His disciples could get some rest. Who in your life do you feel sorry for and how can you help them?

Next Sunday: July 29, 2018 The 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle B

In our Liturgical Calendar we are now in the period called "Ordinary Time". The season is called ordinary because it is ordinated, that is, counted: second Sunday, third Sunday, etc. The Liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green, unless there is a special feast.

This year we are using The Cycle B Lectionary readings, and so our Gospel reading this year will feature the Gospel of Mark. During Ordinary Time the first reading, from the Old Testament, is chosen because of a thematic relation to the Gospel reading. For the second reading, we read semi-continuously from a New Testament letter, currently the letter of Saint Paul to the Church at Ephesus, which we will be reading now until late August.

Gospel Reading (John 6:1-15): We are in a "Cycle B" year with our Lectionary, and normally our Gospel readings are from The Gospel of Mark. However, during the summer of Cycle B,

for five Sundays (17th - 21st Sunday) we read from chapter 6 of John's Gospel. This chapter contains the "Bread of Life Discourse." The discourse begins with an account of Jesus feeding a multitude with a few loaves of bread and a few fish. In John's Gospel, Jesus does this twice. Such "feedings" are described four other times in the other three Gospels. These types of stories must have been very important to the early church which no doubt experienced itself as having very meager resources in the face of great need. There is an obvious similarity to these stories and the story about Elisha which is our first reading for this Sunday. Our readings over these next weeks from John, chapter 6, move from a more earthly understanding of these types of events to a more "spiritual" understanding. (From what satisfies bodily hunger to what satisfies spiritual hunger.)

First Reading (2 Kings 4:42-44): In the Old Testament, God is understood as the source of life. Part of a prophet's mission was to be an agent of life for the people. For a great prophet such as Elisha, even contact with his dead bones could restore a man to life (2 Kings 13). This particular reading portrays Elisha as feeding a hundred people with twenty barley loaves. Such stories are not meant to glorify the prophet, but to show that he is a representative of God, the source of all life.

Second Reading (Ephesians 4:1-6): From prison, Paul urges his listeners to live a life of virtue "worthy of the call you have received." Unity is a theme of this letter, and in this reading Paul points to the source of that unity: "one Lord, one faith, one Baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all."

Saint of the Week

Sharbel Makhluf

This week we will learn about a saint that you have probably never heard of, yet he was beatified and canonized during the lifetimes of many of us. His name is Sharbel Makhluf (or

Charbel Makhluf) and he is a Catholic saint who was a monk of the Maronite Church. The Maronite Church is an Eastern Rite church that is in full communion with Rome. It began primarily in what is today Lebanon and Syria but now consists of approximately 3 million members and has communities all over the world.



Sharbel Makhluf was born in Lebanon in 1828, one of 5 children to Antoun, a mule driver, and Brigitta Chidiac. His father died when he was 3 years old and his mother remarried. He was very pious as a youngster and wanted to be a hermit like two of his uncles. As a child he was required to care for the family sheep. He would take them to a grotto where he had placed an icon of the Virgin Mary and he would spend the day in prayer. In 1851 he entered a monastery in northern Lebanon but later transferred to a monastery near Beirut. It was during this time that he took the name Sharbel after a Christian martyr of the 2nd century. He made his profession in 1853 and was ordained in 1859. He then began to live the life of a monk and practiced severe asceticism. He received permission to live as a hermit in 1875 at the monastery and lived alone until he died from a stroke on December 24, 1898 at the age of 70.

Miracles began to occur immediately after his death. The day after he died a heavy snow was falling and as they took Sharbel's body to its grave the snow stopped and the weather turned fair. A few months after his death a bright light was seen emanating from Sharbel's grave. It was opened and his body was found intact with a blood like fluid coming from it. It was incorruptible until 1956.

Sharbel has been credited with healing miracles. One of them was curing a 55-year-old woman with partial paralysis on January 22, 1993. The woman stated that she saw two Maronite monks standing beside her bed. One of them placed his hands on her neck and began to operate. She

woke the next day and found two wounds on her neck and her paralysis was gone.

At Sharbel's beatification Pope Paul VI said that Sharbel "showed the paramount value of poverty, penance and asceticism, to liberate the soul in its ascent to God in a world" largely fascinated by wealth and comfort. Take some time to learn about some of the other faith communities that are in full communion with the Holy See of Rome and are our brothers and sisters in faith.
