

## Beyond the Land of Labels by Msgr. Don Enzweiler What makes a person a faithful

Catholic? Let's put this question into an historical context.



We know what happens when Jesus appears on this scene. He is not just dismissed as a fly-by-night rabbi who oversteps His bounds. He is intentionally dispatched by His own people. Those Jews who did listen to Jesus and accept His invitation to follow His ways became the foundation of the Catholic Church.

Back to my initial question: what makes a person Catholic is the Sacrament of Baptism. (If one is already Baptized in a different Christian tradition, then official and formal acceptance into the Church makes a person Catholic.) What makes a person a faithful Catholic foremost is acceptance of and belief in Jesus Christ as Son of God and Savior of the world....allowing His words and actions to be the chosen way of life, the example to follow, the standard of measure with regards to conduct, behavior, speech, purpose, motivation. And accepting His mission as one's own.

Faithful Catholics reflect upon their faith. Faith has a central place in understanding all that is happening in their lives. It is relevant to living in this world, in this time and day. Faithful Catholics answer the call to ongoing conversion.

Faithful Catholics commit themselves to prayer, to participation in the Sacraments, to serving their neighbor (especially the poor), to sharing their talents and resources with the community, to desiring to be at peace with everyone, to fulfilling their moral obligations. Faithful Catholics pursue virtue and goodness, promote justice, protect the innocent, strive to understand and to live within the love founded in God and revealed by Jesus Christ by His life, death and resurrection (i.e., the Paschal Mystery). Faithful Catholics seek to give witness to the power of divine love and to the personal transformation that occurs in response to grace.

But how does God respond to non-faithful Catholics, non-practicing Catholics, lapsed Catholics, lost Catholics, misguided Catholics, Catholics who have gone astray, Catholics who have given up any formal practice of their faith, Catholics who choose to live in and for this world instead of in and for the world to come? How does God respond?...the same way he responded to the Israelites who neglected Him in the Old Testament.

God seeks them out; calls them back to Himself; punishes their disobedience; chastises their error, their waywardness, their infidelity. God sends to them prophets of a sort, to speak His word to them, to challenge them to re-consider their path, to call them beyond their sin into a new life that is only possible in Jesus Christ. God does not and will not abandon them. For even though they are unfaithful He is never unfaithful. He is always willing to show mercy, to offer forgiveness and to provide direction. He tries to convince them that they would be better off connected to and in fellowship with a community of believers who support one another, walk with one another in times of suffering and difficulty, who celebrate together the blessings of God, and who work together to bring the light of Christ to the darkness in this world.

There continues to be much talk about Catholic identity. How does the Church identify and recognize its members? What internal and external markers contribute to a person's self-understanding as a member of the Catholic Church? What criteria does the world use to identify someone as Catholic?

Who we are and how we see ourselves is formed and shaped over time. We define ourselves in response to our experiences (physical, cognitive, emotional, social, spiritual). Sometimes we define ourselves according to what we don't want to be and/or don't want to become. Some things are certain: we are not clones, duplicates, copies of one another. We are unique individuals. At the same time we are all human beings living in an imperfect, sinful world. Our lives on this earth are limited and finite. We all have desires, dreams, wants and needs.

Just as a label on a product in the supermarket identifies contents and manufacturer, the label "Catholic" indicates what is inside of us and who made us. We usually become upset and frustrated when the label on a supermarket product exaggerates the quality, the quantity, the state of the contents. We feel we have been duped, deceived, intentionally misled so as to purchase the product. The same holds true for the label "Catholic." When the life of a person who claims to be Catholic does not meet the expected standards of the label, the manufacturer is blamed and held accountable and responsible. The reputation of the manufacturer is harmed. And the company loses customers; they just go elsewhere to get what they want and need. Is it the manufacturer's fault if a product goes bad when it is not "refrigerated after opening"?

Not all labeled products are what they claim to be. And not all mislabeled or unlabeled products are cheap and low in quality. As it is said "the proof is in the pudding." Even so, there are some in the world who will never like or appreciate good pudding. There are others in the world who are happy to satisfy themselves with cheap imitations.

In the end God will determine who is worthy of His Kingdom and who is not. And He doesn't need a label to tell Him what's inside a person's heart.

## Next Sunday: September 10, 2017 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A

In our Liturgical Calendar we are now in the period called "Ordinary Time." The season is called "Ordinary" because it is "ordinated" that is, counted: second Sunday, third Sunday, etc. The Liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green, unless there is a special feast.

This year we are using the "Cycle A" readings, and so our Gospel reading this year will feature the Gospel of Matthew. During Ordinary Time the first reading is from the Old Testament and is chosen because of a thematic relation to the Gospel reading. For the second reading, we read semi-continuously from a New Testament letter, currently Paul's Letter to the Church at Rome.

Gospel Reading (Matthew 18:15-20): The Gospel of Matthew is organized around five "major discourses" that Jesus is portrayed as giving. (The Sermon on the Mount is the first and most famous of these discourses. It begins with the Beatitudes.) This Sunday's reading is from the fourth of these discourses which is referred to as the "Discourse on the Church." This discourse gives teaching on how members of the Christian Community should care for one another. Today's reading has to do with the process of offering correction to someone whose action or inaction has injured the community. The reading also relays some of Jesus' teaching on the community's prayer life. The reading concludes with the familiar words: "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there

am I in the midst of them."

First Reading (Ezekiel 33-7-9): The Book of Ezekiel is one of the four major prophetic works of the Old Testament. The prophet Ezekiel ministered to the people of Israel while they were in exile in Babylon (circa 587 BC). This particular passage conveys the awesome responsibility of his ministry as "watchman for the house of Israel" who will pay with his life if he fails to relay to the people what the Lord reveals to him. Ezekiel often had to deliver words to the people that were very hard for them to hear, particularly his visions from the Lord revealing: 1) the destruction of the Temple and Jerusalem, 2) the Lord leaving the Temple and Jerusalem, and 3) the remainder of the Jewish people being taken into exile into Babylon.

Second Reading (Romans 13:8-10): We are coming to the end of our readings from the letter to the Romans. (We will conclude Romans on Sunday, September 17th.) In this passage, Paul summarizes the commandments: "... for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law... love is the fulfillment of the law."

## Saint of the Week

## Saint Peter Claver



Saint Peter Claver was born on June 26, 1581 in the town of Verdu in northeast Spain. His parents were very devout. As a student at the University of Barcelona he wrote in his notebook, "I must dedicate myself to the service of God until death, on the understanding that I

am like a slave." After finishing his studies he entered the Jesuits and was sent to Palma, Mallorca (a Spanish island in the Mediterranean). There he met the future Saint Alphonsus Rodriguez who told him he should go to New Spain. He landed in Cartagena (in present day Colombia) and went to Bogota to finish his studies to be a priest. It was there that he began to be disturbed by the condition of the African slaves he saw.

Although slavery had been condemned by Pope Paul III and Urban VIII it flourished in both Spanish

and non-Spanish colonies. Peter Claver joined the work of Father Alonso de Sandoval SJ who had been ministering to the slaves for about 40 years. Sandoval worked with the slaves in the fields but Peter Claver met the slave ships as they came into the docks, and brought aid and comfort to them there and in the pens they were transferred to. Besides bringing material goods to them such as medicine and food, as well as other items, he also began to teach the faith with pictures and through interpreters. It is estimated that he converted over 300,000 slaves. When he visited the slaves on the plantations to see how they were progressing he would stay in the slave quarters with them. He also ministered to the well to do and to others, including non-Catholics in Cartagena. Conditions for slaves gradually improved through his efforts.

When his health began to fail he was left in his room and almost forgotten. He lingered in his illness from 1650-1654 and was tended by an exslave who it is said physically abused him. Peter Claver accepted this as penance for his sins. He died on September 8, 1654. The officials who previously considered him a nuisance gave him a public funeral. He was canonized in 1888 (along with Alphonsus Rodriguez) by Pope Leo XIII and named the patron of African missions. The Knights of Peter Claver, the largest African American Catholic fraternal organization in the U.S. and the oldest functioning African American school in Florida are named in his honor as well. His major shrine is on Cartagena, Colombia and his feast day in September 9th.


