#### **To Him Be Glory Forever**

I used to watch the news a lot. Perhaps too much. I never realized that until recently. With all of the news about the Corona Virus, the riots and unrest that seem to go on and on in our cities and the unending division and bickering among our political leaders, I found it was affecting my mood. I was getting depressed and disgusted.

I have found an alternative to this. In the morning I go out on my patio. I take a cup of coffee and my iPad and sit there and pray. As I pray, I notice the things that are around me. We have bird feeders and the birds are flying back and forth, eating and often bickering with each other as they have been since time immemorial.

I look at the trees and the plants of the garden, I notice the changes in the leaves and the growth of the fruit, the same growth that has gone on for thousands of years. When it rains, I sit on the front porch and watch

This year we are using the “Cycle A” readings, and so our Gospel reading this year will feature the Gospel of Matthew. During Ordinary Time the first reading is from the Old Testament and is chosen because of a thematic relation to the Gospel reading. For the second reading, we read semi-continuously from a New Testament letter, currently Paul’s Letter to the Church at Rome.

**Gospel Reading (Matthew 16:21-27):** This passage from the Gospel of Matthew follows right after Peter has recognized Jesus as Messiah and Son of God and Jesus is portrayed as giving a special status to Peter among the apostles (last Sunday’s Gospel reading). This passage describes the fate that awaits Jesus in Jerusalem. Peter is incredulous of this “suffering Messiah” and Jesus denounces him for his incredulity. Jesus is then portrayed as using the occasion to instruct His disciples on what it means to be a lover of God and a disciple of Jesus, “Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me... What profit would there be for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life?”

**First Reading (Jeremiah 20:7-9):** The Book of the Prophet Jeremiah is one of the four major prophetic books of the Old Testament. (Isaiah, Daniel and Ezekiel are the others.) More than any other prophet, Jeremiah relates the human cost to himself for being a prophet. This reading is a good example of how Jeremiah is conflicted about his vocation. For example: “You duped me, O Lord, and I let myself be duped...” and “the Word of the Lord has brought me derision and reproach all the day.” In describing Jesus, New Testament writers (particularly Gospel writers) often use language and imagery that is evocative of Jeremiah’s hardships.

**Second Reading (Romans 12:1-2):** In this passage from the Letter to the Romans, Paul exhorts his listeners to “offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God... Do not conform yourselves to this age, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind.”

**Hope does not disappoint... the love of God has been poured out into our hearts** (Romans 5:5)

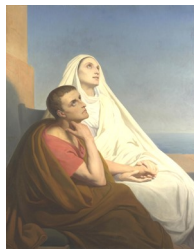

## Saints of the Week

### Monica and Augustine

This week we are going to talk about two saints that are closely linked together, Monica and her son, Augustine. Monica was a Berber (a tribe in north Africa) and was born in 331. She was a Christian and at an early age she was married to a pagan Roman named Patricius. He was a man of violent temper and was also an adulterer. He was continually annoyed with Monica's prayer life and her almsgiving, but it is said that he always respected her. (He converted to the Christian faith on his deathbed.) She had three children that survived: Augustine, a daughter, and another son. Augustine was born in 354. He was not Baptized. His father would not permit it.



Augustine went to school and at 17 he went to Carthage for more schooling. It was here that he left the Christian faith of his mother and became a Manichean. This gnostic religion was based on a duality of light and dark in which light is good and spiritual and dark is evil and material. These two opposing forces are in struggle with each other. When at home he shared his Manichean views with Monica and she drove him away. She later had a vision that she should reconcile with him. She also visited a bishop who told her "a child of those tears shall never perish." It was here when he was about 19, that he began to live a hedonistic life and he fathered a child. He remained with the mother in an unmarried state for 13 years and then abandoned her to marry an heiress. However he never married the heiress. During this time Monica prayed for him to return to the Faith.

Augustine was a teacher of rhetoric and went to Rome and then at the urging of his Manichean friends he went to Milan to be the rhetoric professor at the Imperial Court of Rome. It was in Milan that he abandoned Manichaeism and became a skeptic, (those who doubted the certainty of anything). Monica continued to pray for him. In Milan he met Ambrose (future Saint Ambrose of Milan) and was attracted to Christianity by the stories of Saint Anthony of the Desert. It was here that the famous incident that cemented his conversion occurred. He states in his book, *Confessions*, that he heard a childlike voice saying, "Take up and read" which he took to be a command to open the Bible. He opened and read Romans 13:13-14, "let us conduct ourselves properly as in the day, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in promiscuity and licentiousness, not in rivalry and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the flesh." Ambrose of

Milan Baptized Augustine and his son at the Easter Vigil in 387. After 17 years of prayer Monica had the joy of seeing her son become a Christian. She died within a few months after this. Augustine wrote in his *Confessions* that she said: "My son, as to me, I no longer find any pleasure in this life. What more I have to do here, and why I am still here I do not know." Monica is buried in Ostia, Italy. She is the patron of difficult marriages, disappointing children, victims of adultery or unfaithfulness, victims of verbal abuse, and conversion of relatives. It is reported that she had wept every night for the conversion of her son.

Augustine went on to become one of the greatest figures of the Church. His influence and contributions to the Church and to philosophy are too great to be discussed in this limited space. He died on August 28, 430 at the age of 75. He was named a Doctor of the Church in 1298. His feast day is the day he died, August 28th, and Monica's is August 27th. Prayer does work.
